WE RESIDE IN LEHIGH COUNTY, a place graced with a collection of unique people, places, and institutions gathering together to form an exceptional community. As Trustees of the Harry C. Trexler Trust, we are fortunate not only to live here, but to provide vital financial support to nurture and strengthen organizations that improve the lives of our neighbors.

In 2024, we awarded 89 grants to non-profit organizations that provide life-changing and life-enriching services and programs. Our grants, determined after thorough review and deep reflection, serve to underwrite diverse needs ranging from shelter, food, and education to wellness, culture, and recreation.

The Trust was established almost 90 years ago by two visionary Allentonians, General Harry C. and Mrs. Mary Mosser Trexler. They stipulated that the Trust would perpetually provide monetary support to organizations based in Lehigh County for the benefit of community residents.

Fostering a tangible sense of place has been at the core of the Trexler Trust since its genesis. Together, the Trexlers prioritized the City of Allentown's parks through their bequest of one-third of the Trust's annual giving. After consulting with members of the community, with expert guidance and much consideration over several years, in 2024 we Trustees decided to augment those funds by providing seed money to form The Allentown Parknership. As an independent non-profit organization, the Parknership will raise funds, seek grants and generate support for the City's beloved parks. The Parknership will strengthen the City's ability to provide equitable access to places where people gather, exercise, play and connect with nature and each other. It's a unique opportunity to align Trexler's interests in all aspects of Lehigh County life and leverage our resources to create greater capacity for good.

During our long history we have distributed over \$188 million to Allentown and Lehigh County charities. Every year, we are amazed and humbled to learn about the different and very real ways that Lehigh County charities make our region better. We look forward to continuing to support those many different charitable works.

The figures in this annual report are more than numbers. They reflect the Trust's commitment to the charities that are dedicated to the tireless work of serving their neighbors. We are grateful to the staff and volunteers of all Lehigh County charities who direct their passion and energy to improving lives and creating a distinct and supportive sense of place.

Allentown's unique collection of 44 parks has a new champion: **The Allentown Parknership**. The Parknership is an independent, community-driven non-profit organization created to work with the City to continually improve its parks.


Nurtured over five years with great energy and an investment of more than a half million dollars from the Trexler Trust, the Parknership will collaborate with the City of Allentown to expand and enhance the city's parks, playgrounds and programs.

The Allentown Parknership will raise funds, seek grants and plan fundraising efforts to help the city realize projects and initiatives that meet the community's diverse needs and improve equitable access to parks and activities. Already, the Rider-Pool Foundation has granted \$75,000 toward operating expenses and another half million dollars for The Dorothy Rider Pool Endowment for Culture, Arts and Education. This early support positions the Parknership for significant community impact.

Tarknership

Guided by a City comprehensive parks plan, the Parknership will focus on unmet needs, particularly capital investments such as restoration projects, new facilities and amenities, and park enhancements and improvements.

The Allentown park system reaches throughout the City, and beyond, inviting all residents to play and relax. **The Allentown Parknership** is proud to build on the legacy of General Harry C. Trexler, who established Allentown's first park, West Park, in 1907, expanded it with Lehigh Parkway, made a gift of his summer home, now Trexler Park, and continues to support it through his perpetual trust.




